Vancouver Train Expo 2022 Update

The May/June update for the Bulletin Board commented on the status of preparations for the event. Here's what has transpired since, and what you can do to help make Vancouver Train Expo 2023 happen.

The bad news: Vancouver Train Expo is postponed because of the uncertainty and financial risk posed by COVID.

The good news: The PNE Forum is booked for November 3rd to 5th 2023.

The response to our outreach to exhibitors and vendors was excellent. A few of the historic participants dropped out but a number of new parties appeared, such that we would have been challenged to fit everyone in.

We were able to line up the venue, insurance, and the electrical contractor. Finalizing the furnishings supplier turned out to be more problematic as the previous company had gone bankrupt. At the deadline for a "go ahead" decision we had not tied down a supplier, but had concluded we could come up with a viable solution involving two companies. The cost of staging the event has gone up significantly, but not prohibitively, especially if we can repeat 2019's attendance.

Attendance is harder to predict. The research we were able to do, albeit fragmented, indicated that there was sufficient public interest in the event. The degree to which COVID would influence attendance in November was, and is, unknown.

COVID added an additional level of uncertainty to collecting admission fees at the entrance. Finding sufficient volunteers to perform this task has always been a challenge. We have never opened the doors with a full complement of ticket sellers. Efficiently collecting admission fees is key to the success of the event. There is the obvious monetary aspect. Perhaps more important is audience satisfaction and their recommendations to others. We cannot have people standing in the rain waiting to get in and expect continued good attendance. Social media can instantly tell people what's happening at our doors.

COVID also presented a particular challenge to the Organizing Committee. We are a small group, each with an important function to play leading up to and during event days. As we interact with each other in the lead up to the event, and with a large number of people during the event, it is possible that more than one of us could be sidelined at the same time. The circumstances that led to postponing this year's event clearly illustrated how vulnerable we are to the loss of one or more committee members, particularly during the critical period leading up to, and during event days.

More than anything else, the future of the Vancouver Train Expo depends on having a strong and effective organizing committee, and sufficient event day volunteers. It is incumbent upon all who wish to see the event continue to contribute to a solution.

Cultivating backups for each committee member would make the Committee more robust. Having assistants in the lead up to, and on event days, would provide backups with the background and knowledge to step in should one or more of us be sidelined. Serving as an assistant would provide the opportunity to be involved without taking on the responsibility of a leading committee member. Implementing this practice would also form the basis of a succession plan. The skills required are those of running a business venture. Modeling skills, or even an interest in trains, are not prerequisites. An interest in promoting the hobby, and the business and organizing skills needed to stage an event are more important. When the time comes, please answer the call for event day volunteers by committing to a specific task at a specific time.

In the meantime, the Railway Museum of British Columbia (WCRA) is organizing the Sea to Sky Model Train & Hobby Show 2022 for October 15th and 16th. It is encouraging to see others taking the initiative to organize



We are disappointed with having to postpone Vancouver Train Expo. A lot of time and effort went into getting to the decision point. We are, however, intact financially and, as a committee, ready to try again in 2023. The Forum is booked.

Railway Modellers' Meet of BC 2022 Report

Following two years of "virtual" events, the RMMBC Organizing Committee was anxious to get back to an inperson format for the 2022 RMMBC. Zoom-based clinics are fine, but there are many of these now available on-line, and the on-line format does not lend itself to many of the things that are provided by in-person meets, such as layout tours, operating sessions and the chance to meet face-to-face with your fellow modellers. However, the organizing committee faced a number of challenges when it started to plan the 2022 meet: it was hard to guess what would happen with the COVID pandemic, it was impossible to know if people would be able or willing to attend an in-person event, and our long-term venue, SFU, was not letting us know if we could use their location. From September to February the committee went ahead with recruiting clinicians and making as many other arrangements as it could without knowing the final format of the event.

Finally, in March the committee decided to go ahead with a hybrid approach: four one evening sessions of online clinics combined with an abbrieviated one-day in-person event at a smaller venue along with in-person operating sessions and a layout tour. A large room at the Queensborough Community Centre in New Westminster was rented to provide an easy-to-access location with good facilities and lots of parking.

The on-line portion of the meet started on the evening of May 5th with a welcome, a keynote presentation, three clinics and an online layout tour. A similar set of online clinics and layout tours was presented in each of the

other three Thursdays in May. A total of 16 online clinics, three online layout tours, and one keynote presentation were provided. This year the meet managed to avoid the drama that occured last year with the failed keynote presentation, and all clinics were presented smoothly.

The in-person portion of the meet started on Friday May 27th with the first of two sets of operating sessions. Along with the second set on the following day, there were seven layouts operated, with all sessions fully booked. This highly popular portion of the meet was held without significant problems.

The in-person day at the Queensborough Community Centre was held Saturday May 28th. It included the full range of events held at previous RMMBCs, including award presentations, model displays, Meet the Modeller, and manufacturer displays. It also included a few new events, including table-top clinics (a number of simultaneous presentations of modelling skills allowing attendees to circulate between the clinics and ask the clinician questions), Meet My Layout (a set of very short presentations on attendee's layouts - sort of a mini layout tour), and Meet-Up Sessions (get-togethers of people with similar modelling interests).

The in-person meet ended with a self-guided layout tour held on Sunday May 29th. There were five layouts available to visit in North or West Vancouver.

Overall, the meet was very successful, as attested to by the comments of attendees and the results of on-line surveys. At a *post mortem* meeting held after the meet the organizing committee went through the survey results and their own impressions of how well each of the aspects of the meet worked and what could be improved. Additionally, the committee was happy to find that it had a surplus of just under five hundred dollars this year.

The organizing committee for the 2023 RMMBC will be starting work this September. The hope is that the event can return to SFU for a larger meet similar to pre-pandemic times, possibly combined with a smaller number of on-line clinics. Ross Heriot Memorial Golden Spike Award

The Ross Heriot Memorial Golden Spike award was first made in 1968, and is usually presented annually to an individual (or occasionally more than one) in the PNR 7th Division who has made a significant contribution to the division and its membership. It is in appreciation of his or her unselfish devotion of time and effort to further the aims of the NMRA, the PNR, and the hobby of model railroading through assistance and service for the benefit of all model railroaders within our division. The award can only be received once in a lifetime and candidates are nominated by their peers.

I would especially like to thank those who supplied nominations for consideration for this year's award. I have received a number of letters suggesting this year's nominee.

This year's recipient is Lori Sebelley. She has been an active member of the division for several years. Among her many contributions to the 7th Division, some particular highlights come to mind:

She has served both on the Trains and Railway Modellers Meet of British Columbia organizing committees for several years. On the RMMBC committee she served as organizer for accommodations and food service.

She is an active member of the Coldslap Free-mo Club, participating in public displays for their layout and being an ambassador for our hobby.

Beginning in 2008 she assisted as registrar and executive assistant to the Chairman of the PNR regional convention "Chilliwack Interchange", and subsequently as registrar for the 2016 "Selkirk Express" regional convention is Salmon Arm, for the 2019 "Kootenay Express" regional convention in Cranbrook, and for this year's "Make Tracks to Eugene" convention. She has recently taken on the role of Convention Chair for the upcoming 2024 regional convention planned for Surrey, BC.

It is worth noting that although these events could be considered "Regional" activities, by contributing her time and energy on behalf of our division to regional events she is doing an admirable job of representing, and fulfilling, our division's obligations to the broader NMRA. In so doing she brings us great credit.

Earlier this year Lori was also honoured at the PNR Regional Convention in Eugene, Oregon, as the recipient of the PNR President's award for 2022 for many years of service at the NMRA regional level.

I do hope you will all join me in thanking and acknowledging the hard working Lori Sebelley as the 2022 recipient of the Ross Heriot Memorial Golden Spike award.

Jack Work Trophy Awarded to Scott Calvert

The Jack Work Memorial Trophy is presented to the 7th Division member who best exhibits the qualities that Jack Work displayed, namely: imagination, creativity, innovation, artistry, forward thinking, quality workmanship, and the sharing of the results of these qualities with the rest of the hobby. Nominees must be a member of the 7th Division of the PNR for a minimum of two consecutive years. Recipients may only be awarded the Trophy once.

This year's recipient is Scott Calvert. Scott has been active in the 7th Division for many years, and he has always gone to great lengths to share his knowledge. He has presented numerous clinics, beginning as far back as our days of meetings at Oakridge and extending to recent PNR conventions and the RMMBC in-person and virtual meets. He has written for several modelling magazines to share his expertise.

Where modelling is concerned, perhaps his finest achievement is the entirety of his rendition of the Boundary Subdivision. Along with his faithful reproduction of the track, route, and features of the prototype, he has meticulously produced scenes that replicate the terrain of the era, right down to the exact colour of rocks, trees, and vegetation. He has made numerous trips to the area to make notes, take photos and measurements, and even used a drone extensively to conduct even more prototype research.

The two previous articles in this series described building the CPR 3299 Combine frame and undercarriage (Bulletin Board Volume 36, Issue 2), and swing bolster trucks (Volume 36, Issue 3). Those pieces are almost entirely soldered brass construction, whereas the car body is styrene, with brass detailing, and a wood roof. I started with a large variety of Evergreen extrusions and sheet stock and put it all together using MEK as a solvent cement. It is the active ingredient in commercial styrene "glue." MEK aggressively bonds in seconds and importantly does not leave residue or deface the plastic. It has no gap filling capability. It is however quite noxious, and so must be handled with care. I decant about 30ml into a paint bottle and then use a small very soft brush, or sometimes a hypodermic needle, to apply it. I try to use the minimum necessary and use a fan to maintain fresh air. For bonds between styrene and anything else I use ACC.

I try to make up sub-assemblies that are screwed or bolted together. This facilitates painting, reduces collateral damage from mistakes, and provides for maintenance. The 3299 body subassemblies comprise the main body, the passenger and baggage compartment floors with attached furnishings, and the roof. All are

fastened by machine screws directly to the brass underframe. The roof is attached using brass tubes as shown in the sketch, a technique that also works well for HO models.

The photos of sketches are, well, sketchy, but I think they demonstrate simple designing for model building. I spend as much time sketching as building.

The main body is fashioned from many, many bits of styrene. I find that mass producing pieces for things like window framing verticals yields better uniformity. The horizontal window framing members are one piece the entire length of the section keeping them perfectly aligned through all



augment the detailing. The Vestibule Arrangement sketch illustrates how available extrusions easily build up into complex structures.


The roof is milled from a block of well aged Yellow Cedar, conveniently left over from building a boat. A dado cutter handily establishes the basic section shape. The curved ceiling shapes were milled using a router table with appropriate end stops. The exterior surfaces were shaped with a plane, and the two ends (which are each different) simply filed to shape by eye. Clerestory windows/vents were drilled out for lighting, as shown. The canvas roof was simulated with hockey tape, a uniquely Canadian modelling material.

RIGHT: A cross section of the roof, made from a block of cedar.





ABOVE: I use brass tubes to attach the roof and have found this to be very strong and practically invisible.

the windows. Any discrepancies visually stick out there more than in the vertical framing. One's eye is a very critical judge. Layering the extrusions hides successive sins. The contact heater, stove, seats, and WC bowl are attached to the separate floor piece while other washroom fixtures, the vestibule handbrake lever and safety chains




ABOVE: A sketch showing the design of the vestibule.

The lighting is battery powered, with a micro switch through the baggage room floor. Pintsch light appearance was coarsely but simply simulated with LED's under turned brass roof ventilators.

Painting was almost all done with an air brush, using exclusively those wonderful Floquil paints, now no longer sold. I employ a coarser spray nozzle on large models to maintain a "wet" application. I mix my own CP maroon, and it comes out a little different almost every time. That is fine by me as there are infinite CP Maroons at various stages of weathering and shopping, so why be too fussy? Decals are from always helpful Black Cat, who supplied them specially in O scale. Small details were hand painted warm black. Light dry brushing with white highlights relief and small features.

The interior colours conform with voluminous descriptions, originating I believe with Fred Shannon and shared with me by Ed Warren. Interior walls, floors, and seats received some thin washes and chalk. Fortunately, everything is easily disassembled, making painting much easier.




ABOVE: the unpainted body

Trucks and undercarriage were air brushed warm black, dry brushed with white, and over-sprayed with various densities of rust/black mixes. Rusty spots (clevis pins, etc.) were hand painted, as were glad-hands and so on.

The whole performance was sprayed with flat finish. Chalks may follow, but for now I am retaining a fresher look.

This concludes the three-part series on building the 3299 Combine. As was observed with the swing action trucks, some might question the why of doing fussy modelling that few will ever see. I can only further reflect that there is great enjoyment in discovering and thence modelling the unfolding mysteries of railroads and sharing experiences with others doing the same sort of thing. The 3299 Combine was a lot of work but has been well worth it. It remains one of my favorite models and remains a lasting memory of Ed Warren, the mentor who inspired it.


