
I'm a lifelong modeller having built many layouts, most not worth mentioning. I grew up one block from CNR's division yard in Regina which has influenced my last two layouts (1998-2014 and 2015-current). Once I realized what I really loved I focused on that, aligned my fleet to match, did prototype research and my satisfaction with the hobby soared. It was incredibly satisfying to research city archives, find old photos and then build structures to match.

In 2014 we moved to Courtenay, BC. My HO layout is in the loft above our garage. The room is 13.5' x 26' with the layout being a 30" deep shelf around the ABOVE: Looking down Main Street in Balcarres. The station is walls. There is lots of open area for operators since people space is paramount for operations. The plus is no duck-unders; the downside is the sloped ceiling which limited me to one level. There was no club here when we moved so once I met a few guys I started a club. We now have 40+ members and currently 122 members on our Facebook page.

The system is NCE DCC; almost all locos have sound as well. My locos are all CNR numbers that ran on the prairies. Buildings and autos are also all period correct.

The layout depicts CNR's Saskatchewan prairie region fall 1957. Specifically, I model the Qu'Appelle sub (Melville-Regina) and the Craik behind the buildings on the left. The berm on the right provides the visual block between Balcarres and Davidson. The photo on the Bulletin Board cover shows the same scene from the other direction.

sub (Regina to Saskatoon). The date was chosen to allow for late steam and early diesel.


I began work on this layout in September 2015. It's #12 for me, a lifelong train enthusiast, and I believe I got it more 'right' than ever before.

With the help of a new friend, Rick Cooper, we had the layout up and running in 14 months. December 2016 saw our first operating session and to date we have had over 100 four-hour sessions. 100 x 4 hours x 6 operators = a LOT of running on this layout and it has performed admirably.

I owe the layout's reliability to some 'standards' I set, since the layout was designed primarily for operations. Scenery will get done as I have time; same with structures and details although, if the truth be told, I much prefer working on structures.


#### My standards:

- Code 83 main, 70 spurs
- #8 turnouts on main, #6 for all others
- 42" radius no matter what that requires in terms of track planning
- Staging yards (two with three tracks each which aren't enough!!)
- Trains don't run through the same scenery twice
- Main track on cork; spurs directly laid on the foam
- No grades
- Magnetic uncouplers
- Cars weighted to NMRA standards (some are overweighted 50% as an experiment and they do run nicely!)

This time I really thought through how to best use of my space – room for people, standards as mentioned, how it would be operated, etc., not leaving any stone unturned or any possibility unconsidered. I mean, I really considered and analyzed everything. With each building placement (there are about 100 structures on the layout) I considered reach, line of sight, height, etc. Every track was analyzed in how it would be used and in all the hours of operations, only one small change was done – the addition of a small run around track at Davidson.

The staging yards are along the long walls. The layout is a single track main with three passing sidings, two small towns (Balcarres and Davidson) and Regina is the main city with a division point yard and many industries.

We run the layout point to point (from Melville to Saskatoon) which covers one and a half laps around the room. Between Davidson and Balcarres is a scenic divider so that trains don't appear to run through the same scene twice. With the track plan and schematic you can see the alignment to the real map presented earlier.



## **Operation Sessions**

I was very aware of the need for people space so that was paramount when I designed this layout. The room nicely accommodates five or six people.

The three tracks at right are Melville staging. I was going to place a view block to hide staging but having those extra tracks look like they're part of the yard was too good to hide. Saskatoon staging (on the opposite side of the room) is also visible.



ABOVE: Regina downtown to the left and warehouse district to the right. I researched archives for photos and tried to model actual buildings. For the Simpsons building just in the right edge of the photo, I went to the actual building to match the brick color. Eatons is similar to the prototype of the era and the grey bank building far left is a reasonable facsimile of the Royal bank of that era.

We have the following roles:

- Yardmaster looks after Regina yard and staging yards
- Hostler responsible for locomotive assignments, moves and servicing
- Regina local only services Regina industries
- Staging crew boss runs unit trains and freight trains from staging to staging
- Small town crew takes care of Davidson and Balcarres
- Dispatcher

Trains run from staging to staging. Davidson and Balcarres are just big enough to have a lone switching engineer living there. As freights arrive they stop and "trade" cars with the local switcher. We call this a drop and swap. The local there (small town crew) handles pickups and setouts at local industries.

The same thing happens at Regina except that it involves many more cars. Such a through freight would not run around in Regina spotting and picking up cars so we have a Regina local whose sole job is to take cars out to the Regina industries and bring cars back to the yard to be ready for through freights that will pick them up.

### **Operating Method**

When I started operations over 20 years ago on my previous layout, I researched different methods or tools that people used. I settled on and still use, two methods – Shipit and scenarios.

I selected Shipit software which controls when and where cars are moved. A switchlist for one session (one day) can be generated and printed in literally two minutes. The sessions are continuous so there is virtually no set up from one session to the next. It takes me longer to set up coffee and tidy the room than to set up the layout. Operators only have to carry a switchlist and a throttle.

"Unit trains" each have a scenario sheet to direct their running from staging to staging. Restaging those is done between sessions.

We have a document for each role (mentioned earlier) and quite a bit of other supporting documentation:

- Train line up/schedule
- Roles documents
- Scenarios
- Maps of the track plan and detailed ones for each switching area
- Blocking guides for the yardmaster
- Rules and best practices

We operate every Friday afternoon. It's something we all look forward to every week; it kept us sane through Covid and the 'puzzle' solving no doubt keeps our brains in better shape! And the camaraderie, well, I wouldn't give that up for anything!

I sometimes do think, if I tore this one down, what else would I build? Maybe a different theme but for this room the benchwork footprint, layout height, depth and mainline placement is as optimum as can be. I'm not a genius, I simply did things wrong many times in the past, learned from that and really planned and analyzed things in line with the vision I had.

That would be my suggestion for others – really think about what you want to model and how you want to run your layout. Then really examine your space, set some standards and build the optimum benchwork. Then you can work out a track plan. To create the plan first and then 'fit' it into your space almost guarantees you will make compromises.

# 2022 Railway Heritage Award Presentation

On September 25th at the Victoria Model Railway Show, I had the pleasure of presenting the 2022 Railway Heritage Award to Robert Turner of Protection Island. The award is presented to a member (or members) in the Division who has/have contributed significantly to the preservation of railway history within the Province of British Columbia.

Robert is the author of over 15 books on transportation history (mostly railway related). He has also written over 300 articles and reviews in magazines and journals on both prototype and prototype model subjects. He has given numerous lectures and over 3,000 of his photographs have been widely published in books and magazines as well as being featured in exhibits.

He is a Curator Emeritus at the Royal British Columbia Museum in Victoria after having been their Chief of Historical Collections for many years. As a heritage consultant, he has extensive experience with heritage sites, historic railway operations, restoration projects and museum developments from many countries. He has worked for the Canadian Museum of Civilization, the Canadian Parks Service, the City of Vancouver, the Prince George Railway and Forestry Museum, the Dawson City Museum, the City of Nelson, the Canadian Museum of Rail Travel, the Cowichan Valley Regional District (Kinsol Trestle Restoration), and a number of other institutions and government agencies. Bob has also provided many volunteer services for museums and historical societies throughout British Columbia over many decades.

In 2005 he was awarded the Life Achievement Award by the Canadian Railway Historical Association for his many contributions to Canada's railway heritage.
